Center for Gesture, Sign, and Language Research Grant Opportunity

The goal of the Center for Gesture, Sign, and Language (CGSL) is to explore the interplay among gesture, sign, and language and, in so doing, address basic questions about human language and development. To further this goal, the Center is offering funding for the following purposes during the 2025-26 academic year:

1) Student-led research projects

Eligibility requirements:

- Preference will be given to collaborative projects, i.e. proposed by two (or more) students or
 postdocs, and related to the goal of the Center.
- Preference will be given to projects that are cross-disciplinary in nature, i.e. bring together theory and methods from more than one discipline.
- A faculty advisor must agree to supervise the project; please discuss the proposal with the faculty advisor before submitting it.
- Proposals should include at the top: the name(s) of the researchers, the faculty advisor's name, and the title of the project.

Guidelines:

- Funds may be used for subject payments, RA salaries to assist with coding, and expenses related to data collection (including travel); funds may be used for travel to a conference to report the results of the project.
- Students are expected to give quarterly presentations on their projects; submit a written progress report by in Spring 2026; and submit a final report at the end of their project. If the project is expected to continue into AY 2026-27, the progress report can be submitted with the request for continued funding.

2) ASL language training

Eligibility requirements:

- Students must have completed at least two years of ASL classes at the University of Chicago or equivalent.
- Improving ASL skills must fit within a larger research plan that fits with the Center's goal.
- Students are encouraged to consider ASL classes at Columbia College in Chicago or at Gallaudet University in Washington DC.

Guidelines:

• Funds may be used for tuition and registration fees; if attending Gallaudet University, funds may also be used for transportation costs, housing, and meal plan fees.

To Apply

Please submit a 100-word abstract and a project description of 800-1000 words describing the project (in lieu of an abstract, ASL training requests should include a paragraph describing how this training will contribute to the research aims of the applicant). Include a timeline and budget detailing how the funds (up to \$2,500) will be spent.

Final proposals are due to Zena Levan, zena@uchicago.edu by **Friday, May 2, 2025**. Applicants will be notified by the end of Spring Quarter.
